10TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE  
OCTOBER 19-21, 1983

Last year's N.C.H.O. Conference was hosted by the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. The host site was the Wilmington Hilton on the scenic waterfront of the Cape Fear River.

The host committee was co-chaired by Gary Juhan and Charlie King. The committee arranged a full schedule of activities that included the following highlights.

- Sixteen Vendors offered Door Prizes.

The village has the support of our Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, Dr. David McIntire.

As a result of our campus observance of National Alcohol Awareness Week, we have received a \$300 grant from the national office of BACCHUS. Rick Geis, who wrote the grant proposal and coordinated the program, will present "The Happy Appy Happy Hour" at the ACPA, NASPA, and ACUHO - I conferences. Needless to say we are very proud of this award and national recognition.

We are also happy to announce that we will be recognizing two resident assistants who make us proud. For the first of many years to come, we will be recognizing the superior performance of two of our RAs with the award of a \$100 scholarship. RAs worthy of recognition are being nominated by their supervisors for these scholarships.

### RESIDENCE WATCH PROGRAM INITIATED AT E.C.U.

Based on the Community Watch concept, a Residence Watch Program has been initiated by a group of residents at East Carolina University. On Central Campus, which contains three coed and two single sex residence halls, the residents were concerned about the vandalism and trespassers, so they looked for ways that they could make their homes safer. Their answer: Residence Watch.

Interested residents signed up and attended hall meetings. They received pamphlets explaining the program and are now participating in educational programs promoting residence hall safety by the Department of Public Safety.

By caring and watching out for each other, there has been an increased amount of thieves and trespassers reported, and a decrease in vandalism in at least two of the buildings.

In turn I will forward the articles to James Bowles, Editor of the SEAHO REPORT.

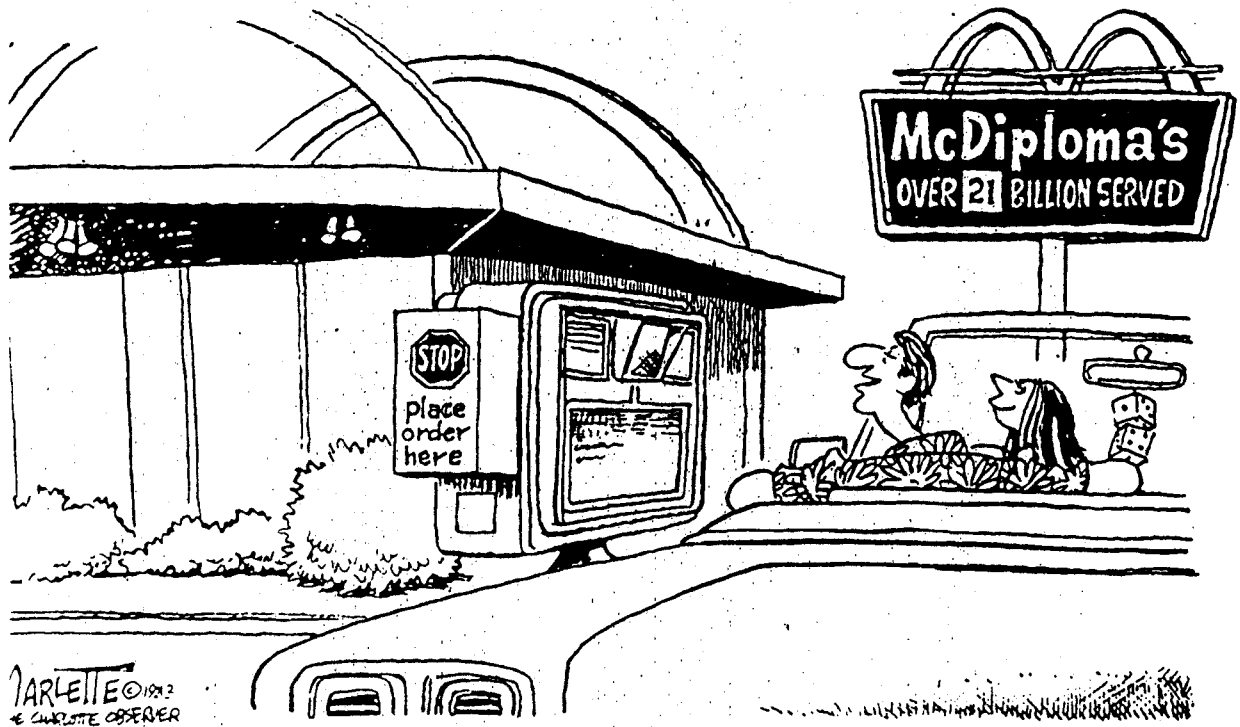
